# Report against Queensland Bilateral Schedule E3

Reporting period 1 July 2018 – 30 June 2019 for publication by 31 October 2019

#### Overview

1. This Report prepared by the Department of Housing and Public Works (DHPW) to monitor progress under the National Housing and Homelessness Agreement (NHHA) fulfils the annual reporting requirements *per* clause 40 of the NHHA and Part 6 of Schedule E<sub>3</sub> and brings together existing, non-financial reporting to ensure no duplication of effort.

#### Housing

2. The below table contains an update on the components of Queensland's publicly available housing strategy for the purposes of the NHHA, including the *State Planning Policy*, *Planning Act 2016*, *ShapingSEQ - South East Queensland Regional Plan 2017*, *State Infrastructure Plan*, *Queensland Housing Strategy 2017-2027* and the *Queensland Housing Strategy 2017-2020 Action Plan*.

State Planning Policy	The State Planning Policy (SPP) came in to effect on 3 July 2017 and has remained in place throughout 2018-19.
	Through the state interest review process, all new planning schemes and major amendments proposed by local governments are assessed by the state to ensure that state interests are appropriately integrated.
	Guidance material is available for each state interest to help support local government in the implementation of the SPP when making or amending a local planning instrument.

The *Queensland Housing Strategy 2017-27*, underpinned by the *Queensland Housing Strategy 2017-2020 Action Plan* and *Partnering for impact to reduce homelessness in Queensland*, form Queensland's publicly available homelessness strategy that meets the requirements of s.15C of the Commonwealth's *Federal Financial Relations Act 2009*.

Building two new youth foyers and expanding the Logan Youth Foyer	The expansion of the Logan Youth Foyer from 22 units of accommodation to 40 units was completed in July 2019. The Queensland Government announced that Pimlico TAFE is the preferred site for the Townsville Youth Foyer, stakeholders including the local community will be engaged to inform the design for the proposed site.
	Community consultation regarding the Gold Coast Youth Foyer was completed on 24 September 2019.

#### Indigenous Australians

Replacing shelters in Woorabinda, Pormpuraaw, and Cherbourg	The replacement shelter in Cherbourg was completed in July 2018 and Pormpuraaw was completed in August 2019. The replacement shelter in Woorabinda is not yet due for completion
Rockhampton River to Home	A five-year funding agreement was executed for this service in June 2018 and housing outcomes are being delivered per the contract.

# People exiting institutions and care into homelessness

Elements of the homelessness strategy	Status
Homelessness Emergency Department Liaison	The service continues to play an important role in information provision / education on matters impacting on people experiencing homelessness to Emergency Department staff – doctors, nurses and allied health services. The service builds and strengthen professionals' relationships with community services. This means targeted referrals and collaborative service delivery can support the patient leaving hospital to navigate the services they need with reduced anxiety.
Coordinated Housing and Support for women on parole at risk of homelessness	The initiative operates at two pilot sites: South East Queensland, which commenced in January 2018 and North Queensland/ Townsville which commenced in late September 2018.
	Both pilots were designed to operate for three years. An evaluation of the initiative by the University of Queensland (UQ) is being undertaken.
Supported Independent Living Services for Young people under Child Protection Orders	Supported independent living services are being provided to young people aged 15 to under 18 years with moderate to high support needs who are transitioning to independent living.
Re-entry Support Services	During 2018-19 a total of 10,509 prisoners received re-entry services prior to release. These prisoners had contact with re-entry services 31,827 times.
	In the same period a total of 4,440 offenders in the community received re-entry support, having contact with re-entry services 18,524 times.
	As of July 2019, the QCS Post Release Support Accommodation Service (PRSA) will commence. This service will deliver supported accommodation services to males exiting correctional centres to Parole supervision across the areas of Cairns, Townsville, Moreton Bay and Toowoomba.

Elements of the homelessness strategy	Status
Transition Post Care Support	The Transition and Post Care Support Program is delivered by 16 Transition Officers across Queensland providing direct support to young people aged 15-21 years, with a disability and/or complex needs transitioning from the care of Child Safety to adulthood. This support involves the development of skills to maintain a safe and stable place to live; strengthening engagement with community and culture; and ensuring the young person can readily access further supports such as general health, mental health and employment services. Transition Officers also assist with access to culturally appropriate services and the NDIS where needed.
	For the reporting period of 1 July 2018 – 30 June 2019, Transition Officers across all components of the Program provided transition and post care support to 213 young people aged between 15 and 21 years across Queensland, 54 of whom were Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander.

#### Older people

Elements of the homelessness strategy	Status
Support vulnerable women, including older women at risk of homelessness, to access and sustain safe and secure housing and support services	The Queensland Government continues to deliver enhanced support for older Queenslanders by implementing service improvements and access to suitable housing for older vulnerable women. The Queensland Government recognises this is a growing cohort and work is underway to review our service offering to better respond to this need.

Strengthening the service system– enabling sector-led innovation and providing flexibility for responsive place-based solutions	The Queensland Department of Housing and Public Works is collaborating with housing and homelessness service providers and peak organisations to support integrated service delivery initiatives specific to case coordination and capacity and capability building of local networks.
Expanding our capabilities– developing a shared research agenda	The Deck was launched in September 2019 and is available online. <u>thedeck.org.au</u>
Expanding our capabilities– enabling the sector to showcase innovation and promote good practice	The Queensland Department of Housing and Public Works is partnering with homelessness service providers and peak organisations to undertake exploratory work into funded provider service delivery standards and certification processes.
